

FAITH IS PERSONAL

JUDGES 2:8-15

After Joshua's death, the people of Israel became complacent. The passage says they "forsook" the Lord (verse 12), which means they turned away from him. But their turning away wasn't toward nothing: in their emptiness. they turned to other gods. As a result, they suffered. Why? Because they turned from the living, available God toward empty idols that could not save, help, or empathize.

The truth? We cannot borrow faith. Nor can we rely on our parents' or grandparents' faith to save us. Although the Israelites in Joshua's generation saw great deliverance and worshiped God with abandon, the next generation failed to do so. They didn't personalize their faith; they chose not to pursue God for themselves. This led to a vacuum of belief.

It is a privilege to actively put our faith in God. Whether you've had faith examples through your family or you have no spiritual heritage, right now you have the opportunity to love and worship God with your whole heart.

Ask him to come near, even if you have ventured far. God loves to answer the prayers of those seeking him. He loves you.

Noah and the Flood

9This is the account of Noah and his family.

Noah was a righteous man, blameless among the people of his time, and he walked faithfully with God. ¹⁰Noah had three sons: Shem, Ham and Japheth.

¹¹Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight and was full of violence. 12 God saw how corrupt the earth had become, for all the people on earth had corrupted their ways. 13 So God said to Noah, "I am going to put an end to all people, for the earth is filled with violence because of them. I am surely going to destroy both them and the earth. ¹⁴So make yourself an ark of cypress^d wood; make rooms in it and coat it with pitch inside and out. 15 This is how you are to build it: The ark is to be three hundred cubits long, fifty cubits wide and thirty cubits high. e 16 Make a roof for it, leaving below the roof an opening one cubit high all around. Put a door in the side of the ark and make lower, middle and upper decks. ¹⁷I am going to bring floodwaters on the earth to destroy all life under the heavens, every creature that has the breath of life in it. Everything on earth will perish. 18 But I will establish my covenant with you, and you will enter the ark - you and your sons and your wife and your sons' wives with you. 19 You are to bring into the ark two of all living creatures, male and female, to keep them alive with you. ²⁰Two of every kind of bird, of every kind of animal and of every kind of creature that moves along the ground will come to you to be kept alive. 21 You are to take every kind of food that is to be eaten and store it away as food for you and for them."

²²Noah did everything just as God commanded him.

The LORD then said to Noah, "Go into the ark, you and your whole family, because I have found you righteous in this generation. 2Take with you seven pairs of every kind of clean animal, a male and its mate, and one pair of every kind of unclean animal, a male and its mate, 3 and also seven pairs of every kind of bird, male and female, to keep their various kinds alive throughout the earth. 4Seven days from now I will send rain on the earth for forty days and forty nights, and I will wipe from the face of the earth every living creature I have made."

JEREMIAH 29:4-14

Jer for

Jeremiah the prophet penned these words for those living in exile, to offer hope and perspective as they toiled in a foreign land, far from Jerusalem, their homeland's capital and spiritual center. He reminds the exiles to keep living—to build homes, plant gardens, and marry.

Jeremiah reminds them of this powerful truth: exile should not prevent living.

While the exile of Israel seems remote to us, you actually live as an exile on this earth. This is not your home, but if you believe there's nothing to do but wait here complacently until the end comes, you will miss out on truly living. To have hope in exile is to live with fervor in the here and now. Jeremiah reminds you to seek the prosperity of the place you're living, not the place you hope to be. He basically states the familiar adage, "Bloom where you're planted."

You won't always be in exile. There will come a day when God wipes every tear from your eyes, and there will no longer be weeping or pain. But until then? Bloom. Live. Demonstrate your future hope by your actions today to bless your present circumstances. There is much joyful work to do!



Lord, as I am exiled here, I pray you would empower me to live with hope. I truly want to bloom where you've planted me, no matter my circumstances. Thank you for hope. Thank you for teaching me perseverance in exile. Amen.

Now Abram was living near the great trees of Mamre the Amorite, a brother^a of Eshkol and Aner, all of whom were allied with Abram. ¹⁴When Abram heard that his relative had been taken captive, he called out the 318 trained men born in his household and went in pursuit as far as Dan. 15 During the night Abram divided his men to attack them and he routed them, pursuing them as far as Hobah, north of Damascus. 16He recovered all the goods and brought back his relative Lot and his possessions, together with the women and the other people.




